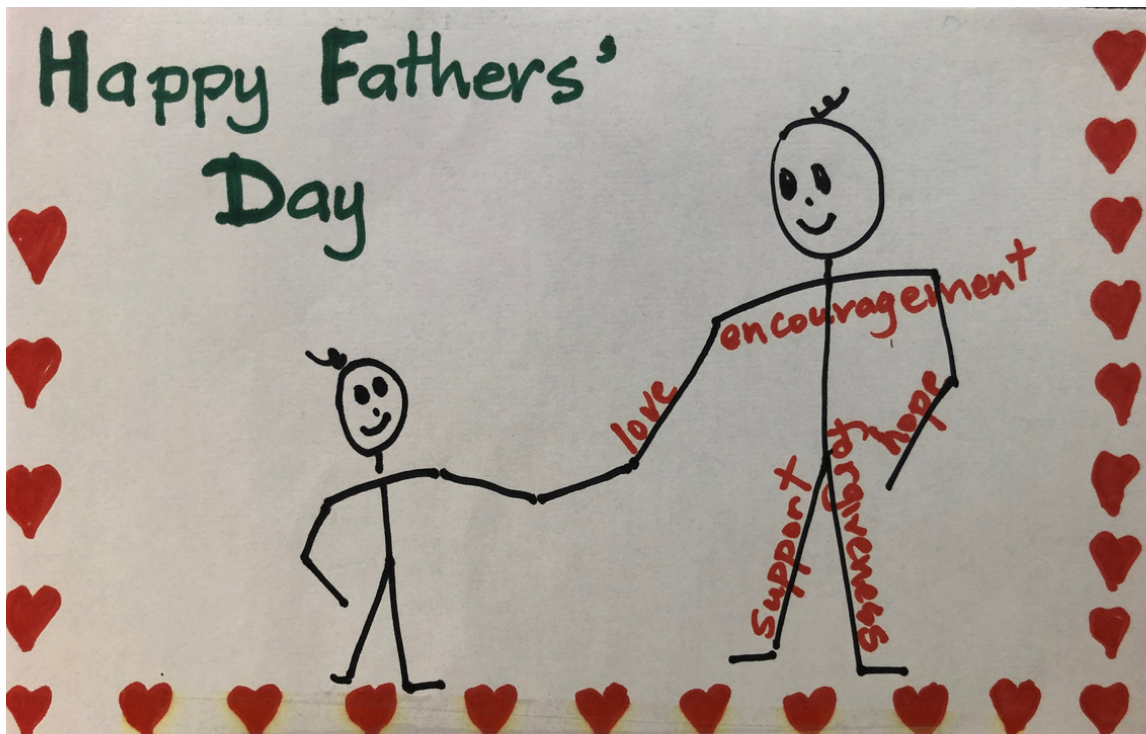

Front Page

For the front page of the card, you will draw a colorful design to represent the holiday.

Back Page

The back page should be left blank.



Inside Top

Choose a scripture verse or thoughtful holiday-themed message. You may use the ideas below as inspiration or choose your own.

- "As a father has compassion on his children, so the LORD has compassion on those who fear him." – Psalm 103:13
- "The father of the righteous will greatly rejoice; he who fathers a wise son will be glad in him." – Proverbs 23:24

Inside Bottom

On the bottom of the inside page, each student should write a personalized message to the incarcerated person.

The greeting should say something like, "Dear Friend" or "Dear Brother." This message should be optimistic and cheerful. It can express holiday-related messages, as well as general encouragement.

The goal is to spread love and kindness at Father's Day.

The card can be signed with a student's first name and grade, with a closing such as "Love, Kayla, a 9th Grade Student." The last name should not be included.

Please do not add embellishments such as sequins, glitter, gemstones, etc.
